As I look back at 2024, I see a remarkable year. It is marked, for me, as the year St. Catherine's got out of Covid/post Covid mode and moved swiftly into growth mode. It has been the most alive the parish has felt to me since at least 2019 and I am hopeful, inspired and grateful.

We have welcomed so many new faces-people from all ages and stages of life. We have welcomed new staff members. We have continued to grow and strengthen Caritas Connections, our lay pastoral care ministry, our Seniors on the Go ministry continues to connect people in fun and meaningful ways, we have experimented with new ways to connect with people throughout the community with our reimagining of our social media presence. We have worked to ensure the safety of all who dwell in these walls-church, preschool, scouts, Family Promise and other members of the community that call St. Cat's home. We began work that will continue into 2025 at looking at how to grow and strengthen the Preschool and our connection to it. And we experimented with ways to better serve and connect with the community of East Cobb. We welcomed Trey Phillips as Senior Associate Rector and I went on a 3-month sabbatical.

In the parish profile that drew me to St Cat's one of the tasks this church asked of its Rector was to "help us gently move out of our comfort zone" and help move out the parish out into the world. We continue to look at the needs of the world, even when it sometimes makes us uncomfortable. All God's Children continues its work, including book studies and challenging conversations. AGC embarked on its 3rd Pilgrimage, this time to Charleston. As I reflect on what AGC does, for me, it asks the question again and again—who is my neighbor and equips us to begin to "go and do likewise." Sometimes the question—who is my neighbor—is a challenging question. Sometimes it's a hard question. It's always a good question and usually brings us to new places of connection with the community and the Holy in our midst.

And in trying to be a bit more outward facing: we tried some new experiments. We sent home candy and prayer flags for All Souls, and Advent wreaths and prayer materials for Advent and Christmas to our Wheeler parkers, Preschool Parents and a couple of other community groups that meet at St. Cats.

We had three times more flags this year than usual and had to create new places to hang them up. We ran out of bulletins at the late Christmas Eve service. Our newcomers ministry got an overhaul and so did our newcomer gatherings. Deep bow of gratitude for Trey and team for one of the best newcomer events I've participated in during my 20 years of ministry.

Throughout the year we had many invitations to the community of East Cobb: we offered cooking classes for all ages. We offered yoga classes—free of charge during my sabbatical. We continue to have three yoga classes here weekly, open to the entire Marietta community. Two are offered on a sliding scale and one is free of charge. People who have never been to St Cats before have made their way here via yoga mat. And we began a new relationship with Coro Vocatti, who now calls St Catherine's home. From rehearsals to concerts, we are delighted to be known as a place with great music in East Cobb.

I have said, multiple times, that I want St Catherine's to be the premiere place for families with young children to come and learn about Jesus, community, spirituality and love. I think we are well on our way. The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program at St. Cat's is one of the finest in the Diocese. A friend of mine recently opened a CGS classroom. As they were showing it off to families, one of the kids, who sometimes attends St Cat's, said "it looks just like St. Catherine's Atrium!" My priest friend said there was no better compliment she could receive than to hear her CGS space compared with ours. I say this not to brag (well maybe a little to brag) but also to remind the parish that we have one of the most theologically sound curriculums being offered in our church. This year we added an atrium or classroom for toddlers. We are growing spiritually as well as numerically.

We continued with Choristers, who grow with God through song and help lead us in worship and we continued Parents Night Out. We added Wonder Church, as space for kids and their adults to explore faith and church outside of the traditional Sunday morning liturgy. We added a soft space. Last week, every single rocking chair was filled with a parent rocking their baby. This Lent we will experiment with a Children's Chapel format. Look for workshops for parents, open not only to St Cat's parents but also to Preschool parents. Our relationship with the Preschool continues to grow and I hope to strengthen the connection between Preschool and Church, between parents, students and this community. Our youth went on pilgrimage and earned house points. New faces and returning ones join us on Sundays and Wednesdays.

Perhaps less visible, but truly essential—we strengthened our financial and administrative processes. I joke all the time that when I'm long gone, St Cat's will refer to me not as the former Rector, but as the Policy Queen. But yes, we made more policies that we hope will ensure the financial stewardship, safety and strength of the parish for years to come. We had our 2023 audit done ahead of schedule and passed with flying colors.



The work before us in 2025 is exciting, large, and doable.

We need to continue to be a place that welcomes people of all walks of life into our midst. The world is hurting. People are looking for connection, community and meaning. St. Cat's is uniquely positioned to be a place of hope, healing, and compassion in East Cobb. Our programs are a balm for the epidemic of loneliness in our world. We will double down on what we know is a source of healing, hope and joy. Small groups, from Foyers to Being With, will continue and I anticipate will continue to grow, as we journey together.

Our beloved building needs some care. Our rugs in the narthex and surrounding area are as old as the space...and they look it. The parking lot needs some major love. I dream of a place where people who have mobility challenges can find an easier entrance to our space. Our mortgage is so close to being paid off....and yet so far away. All to say—the building that holds us for worship, and enables us to be a space for community—it needs some care. Bill Ivey will rightfully retire mid-year and we'll be looking for a new Facilities Manager, and we'll be looking at ways we might care for our facility so that it can carry us into the next 60 years of ministry.

And, one of biggest and loftiest goals is to bring back a full-time programmatic position. While the details of this position are flexible, the bottom line is that we need the return of a third full-time position to meet the many pastoral and programmatic needs of this growing and vibrant parish.

And we need you. We need people engaged in ministries, big and small. We need people engaged in ministries that delight, challenge and help us grow,

both as individuals and as a church community. I hope that as we step fully and joyfully in to 2025, you will consider where your heart is calling you and where your curiosity is inviting you to explore, both at St Cat's and in the world.

A few thank you's that need to be made:

Tom Donoghue for saying yes to being Treasurer and working tireless hours to get our financials in shape and our procedures efficient and our policies clear. There were times I think he wanted to throw the towel in, but he didn't. He hung in there with us and has made us stronger and more transparent.

Margaret Shaw, who co-wrote the Lilly Sabbatical Grant with me. Margaret-thank you for not-so-gently pushing me to do this.

The St Cat's Vestry and Staff: We will be here until Tuesday if I name everyone by name and gift. But suffice it to say that the staff and Vestry continue to rise to what is before them and this happened during the sabbatical as well.

Trey, Annie & Rowan Phillips: While I never had any doubts or worries about the care the parish was receiving in my absence, what Trey gave to this place exceeded expectations. I try not to take it too personally that Sunday attendance numbers skyrocketed in my absence! Trey's preaching, pastoral care and leadership were evident to me from the moment he walked through the door. And he exercised those gifts with such graciousness in my absence. I am in his debt. Being a priest takes a toll, often on your family. Annie and Rowan-thank you for sharing Trey with us. We could not have done it without him and he could not have done it without the two of you.

Nelson and Emily Gale: It is a truly brave soul who is willing to serve as Senior Warden during the Rector's sabbatical. Perhaps even braver is the spouse of the Senior Warden. On my sabbatical, I reached out to Nelson twice. Twice I was told to leave work alone and that y'all were just fine and to return to my sabbatical at once! Because of Nelson's strong and faithful leadership, I was able to experience a once in a lifetime sabbatical. A deep bow of gratitude to the Gale family for all they've done during Nelson's tour of duty as Senior Warden, but especially for his time during my sabbatical. Nelson—I don't think you have any idea how much respect and love I carry for you. You are one of the greatest gifts of getting to do ministry in this place. You teach and lead with integrity, kindness, clarity and love. I am better for your love of this place. St Cat's is too.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

Karen Maxwell

Team Leader

What is the mission of your ministry?

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is an approach to faith formation for children ages 18 months to 11 years old that helps children come to know God through Jesus as proclaimed in the Bible and through the Liturgies of Baptism and the Eucharist. All that is presented to children in a specially prepared sacred space called the atrium is designed with their developmental and spiritual needs in mind.

What have been 1 or 2 highlights of this year?

This year we began a toddler atrium for our youngest members of the church, 18 months to 3 years under the direction of Kristi Johnson. We now have four atria for children: toddler atrium, Level I for 3-6 year old children, Level II for children 6-9 years (or first through third grade children) and Level III for 9-11 year old children (or fourth-fifth grade children).

What are any plans/ideas you have for the coming year?

We continue to not only look at ways that we are engaging our children and nurturing their prayer lives in the atrium but also how to involve them in the life of the church. All that is offered to children at each level indirectly prepares children for greater participation in the life of church as well as nurtures their awareness of God's love for them.

Where have you seen God at work in your ministry?

Most notably we observe God's work through the children - through the connections they make from the Gospel announcements or the liturgical presentations that they hear or see and through their verbal and art responses as well as through their work with the materials in the atrium. J. in Level I, a 4 year old, often gathers materials like a small chalice, paten, Bible from different areas of the atrium - the baptism area, the altar area, and puts them on the prayer table or on the small altar while singing Hosanna in the highest!

Another time he has used the Eucharistic Presence of the Good Shepherd materials to offer the people communion and pulls significant materials from other presentations to be part of the small altar (see photo). We give children the sacred space and time to contemplate the mysteries and realities of our faith.

How have your experienced our core values in your work this year?

As catechists serving children in each of these atria our very work with them is loving, nurturing, generous and even courageous. We proclaim the Gospel with children of all ages and we listen with them to the Word of God allowing space and time first for children to respond to what they are hearing of God's Word. Children don't often get this opportunity because adults don't often know how to listen with children. We pray with children and as they get older they prepare their own prayer services. We notice with them the signs and symbols and the meaning behind them to the liturgies of Baptism and Eucharist and do this according to their developmental needs. What we offer children and the manner that we do it is courageous and generous.
